Executive Summary

This Developer Fee Justification Study demonstrates that the Tipton Elementary School District requires its share of the full statutory impact fee to accommodate impacts from development activity.

A fee of \$3.79 per square foot for residential construction and a fee of \$0.61 per square foot for commercial/industrial construction is currently assessed on applicable permits pulled in the District. The new fee amounts are **\$4.79** per square foot for residential construction and **\$0.78*** per square foot for commercial/industrial construction. This proposed increase represents \$1.00 per square foot and \$0.17 per square foot for residential and commercial/ industrial construction, respectively. The Districts share of the developer fees is 66.67%.

The following table shows the impacts of the new fee amounts:

The total projected number of housing units to be built over the next five years is 5. The average square feet per unit is 1,917. This Study demonstrates a need of \$9.50 per square foot for residential construction.



Background

Education Code Education Code Section 17620 allows school districts to assess fees on new residential and commercial construction within their respective boundaries. These fees can be collected without special city or county approval, to fund the construction of new school facilities necessitated by the impact of residential and commercial development activity. In addition, these fees can also be used to fund the reconstruction of school facilities to accommodate students generated from new development projects. Fees are collected immediately prior to the time of the issuance of a building permit by the city or the County.

The impact of new developments result in the need for either additional or modernization of school facilities to house the students generated. Because of the high cost associated with school facility projects and the District's limited budget, outside funding sources are required for school projects. State and local funding sources for the construction and/or reconstruction of school facilities are limited.

The authority sited in Education Code Section 17620 states in part "... the governing board of any school district is authorized to levy a fee, charge, dedication or other form of requirement against any development project for the construction or reconstruction of school facilities." The legislation originally established the maximum fee rates at \$1.50 per square foot for residential construction and \$0.25 per square foot for commercial/industrial construction. Government Code Section 65995 provides for an inflationary increase in the fees every two years based on the changes in the Class B construction index. As a result of these adjustments, the fees authorized by Education Code 17620 are currently **\$4.79** per square foot of residential construction and **\$0.78** per square foot of commercial or industrial construction.



Purpose and Intent

Prior to levying developer fees, a district must demonstrate and document that a reasonable relationship exists between the need for new or reconstructed school facilities and residential, commercial and industrial development. The justification for levying fees is required to address three basic links between the need for facilities and new development. These links or nexus are:

<u>Burden Nexus</u>: A district must identify the number of students anticipated to be generated by residential, commercial and industrial development. In addition, the district shall identify the school facility and cost impact of these students.

<u>Cost Nexus</u>: A district must demonstrate that the fees to be collected from residential, commercial and industrial development will not exceed the cost of providing school facilities for the students to be generated from the development.

<u>Benefit Nexus</u>: A district must show that the construction or reconstruction of school facilities to be funded by the collection of developer fees will benefit the students generated by residential, commercial and industrial development.

The purpose of this Study is to document if a reasonable relationship exists between residential, commercial and industrial development and the need for new and/or modernized facilities in the Tipton Elementary School District.

Following in this Study will be figures indicating the current enrollment and the projected development occurring within the attendance boundaries of the Tipton Elementary School District. The projected students will then be loaded into existing facilities to the extent of available space. Thereafter, the needed facilities will be determined and an estimated cost will be assigned. The cost of the facilities will then be compared to the area of residential, commercial and industrial development to determine the amount of developer fees justified.



Enrollment Projections

In 2021/2022 the District's total enrollment (CBEDS) was 537 students. The enrollment by grade level is shown here in Table 2.

This data will be the basis for the enrollment impacts which will be presented later after a review of the development projections and the student generation factors.



Student Generation Factor

In determining the impact of new development, the District is required to show how many students will be generated from the new developments. In order to ensure that new development is paying only for the impact of those students that are being generated by new homes and businesses, the student generation factor is applied to the number of new housing units to determine development-related impacts.

The student generation factor identifies the number of students per housing unit and provides a link between residential construction projects and projections of enrollment. The State-wide factor used by the Office of Public School Construction is 0.50 for grades TK-8. For the purposes of this Study we will use the local factors to determine the students generated from new housing developments. This was done by comparing the number of housing units in the school district to the number of students in the school district as of the 2020 Census. Table 3 shows the student generation factors for the various grade groupings.

When using the Census data to determine the average district student yield rate, it is not possible to determine which students were living in multi-family units versus single family units. Therefore, only the total average yield rate is shown. The Census data does indicate that **78.2%** of the total housing units within the district boundaries are single family units. It is reasonable to assume that the construction of new housing units would be similar to the current housing stock, which was confirmed by the various planning departments within the school district boundaries, and therefore the overall student generation rate will be used to determine student yields from the projected developments.



New Residential Development Projections

The Tipton Elementary School District has experienced an average new residential construction rate of approximately 1 unit per year over the past two years. This was determined by reviewing the residential permits pulled and school development impact fees paid to the District. After contacting the planning departments within the school district boundaries, it was determined that the residential construction rate over the next five years will average 1 unit per year. Projecting the average rate forward, we would expect that 5 units of residential housing will be built within the District boundaries over the next five years.

To determine the impact of residential development, a student projection is done. Applying the student generation factor of 0.5051 to the projected 5 units of residential housing, we expect that 3 students will be generated from the new residential construction over the next five years. This includes 2 elementary school students and 1 middle school student.

The following table shows the projected impact of new development. The students generated by development will be utilized to determine the facility cost impacts to the school district.

Existing Facility Capacity

To determine the need for additional school facilities, the capacity of the existing facilities must be identified and compared to current and anticipated enrollments. The District's existing building capacity will be calculated using the State classroom loading standards shown in Table 6. The following types of "support-spaces" necessary for the conduct of the District's comprehensive educational program, are not included as "teaching stations," commonly known as "classrooms" to the public:

Because the District requires these types of support facilities as part of its existing facility and curriculum standards at its schools, new development's impact must not materially or adversely affect the continuance of these standards. Therefore, new development cannot require that the District house students in these integral support spaces.

Classroom Loading Standards

The following maximum classroom loading-factors are used to determine teaching-station "capacity," in accordance with the State legislation and the State School Building Program. These capacity calculations are also used in preparing and filing the baseline school capacity statement with the Office of Public School Construction.

Existing Facility Capacity

The State determines the baseline capacity by either loading all permanent teaching stations plus a maximum number of portables equal to 25% of the number of permanent classrooms or by loading all permanent classrooms and only portables that are owned or have been leased for over 5 years. As allowed by law and required by the State, facility capacities are calculated by identifying the number of teaching stations at each campus. All qualified teaching stations were included in the calculation of the capacities at the time the initial inventory was calculated. To account for activity and changes since the baseline was established in 1998/99, the student grants (which represent the seats added either by new schools or additions to existing schools) for new construction projects funded by OPSC have been added. Using these guidelines the District's current State calculated capacity is shown in Table 7.

This table shows a basic summary of the form and procedures used by OPSC (Office of Public School Construction) to determine the capacity of a school district. There were a total of 14 permanent classrooms in the District when the baseline was established. In addition, there were 10 portable classrooms. However, OPSC regulations state that if the number of portables exceeds 25% of the permanent classrooms, then the maximum number of portables to be counted in the baseline capacity is 25% of the permanent classrooms. Therefore, the chart shows the chargeable portables as 4 which is 25% of the permanent classroom count. This results in a total classroom count of 18 and is referred to as the chargeable classrooms since it accounts for the fact that some of the portables were not included in the total. This is done to account for the fact that portables are typically considered to be temporary, especially when the total number exceeds 25% of the permanent classrooms.



To determine the total capacity based on State standards, the capacity of the chargeable classrooms are multiplied by the State loading standards and then the capacity of the projects completed since 1998/99 (when the baseline was established) are added based on the State funded new construction projects. As Table 7 shows, the total State capacity of the District facilities is 689 students.

Unhoused Students by State Housing Standards

This next table compares the facility capacity with the space needed to determine if there is available space for new students from the projected developments. The space needed was determined by reviewing the historic enrollments over the past four years along with the projected enrollment in five years to determine the number of seats needed to house the students within the existing homes. The seats needed were determined individually for each grade grouping. The projected enrollment in this analysis did not include the impact of any new housing units.

The District capacity of 689 is more than the space needed of 560, assuming the existing facilities remain in sufficient condition to maintain existing levels of service. The difference is 129 students.



Calculation of Development's Fiscal Impact on Schools

This section of the Study will demonstrate that a reasonable relationship exists between residential, commercial/industrial development and the need for school facilities in the Tipton Elementary School District. To the extent this relationship exists, the District is justified in levying developer fees as authorized by Education Code Section 17620.

Reconstruction/Modernization Costs

In addition to any new facilities needed, there is also a need to reconstruct or modernize existing facilities in order to maintain the existing levels of service as students from new development continue to arrive in the District's facilities. In order to generate capacity, it may also be necessary to reopen closed school facilities. Such reopening often requires reconstruction in order to provide the District's existing level of service. For purposes of this report, the analysis of modernization/reconstruction includes the possible reopening and refurbishing of closed or unused school facilities.

California has made a significant investment in school facilities through grants provided to help extend the useful life of public schools. The State's largest funding source for public school modernization projects, the School Facilities Program (SFP), requires a minimum local funding contribution of 40% of SFP-eligible costs. The State may provide up to 60% of the eligible costs at those times that State funding is available. However, SFP modernization grants frequently, if not usually, fall short of providing 60% of the actual costs for major modernizations. In the best cases, developer fees can help meet the District's required 40% local share. In many cases, developer fees may be necessary to supplement both the State's and the school district's contribution to a project.

Buildings generate eligibility for State reconstruction/modernization funding once they reach an age of 25 years old for permanent buildings and 20 years old for portables.

The usable life of school facilities is an important consideration in determining district facility needs into the future. The specific time when the projected residential developments will be built cannot be precisely predicted. Some new homes may be immediately occupied by families with school aged children, while others may be immediately occupied who will have school-aged children in five to ten years. As a result of these variables, for each new home, the District must be prepared to house the students residing there for an extended period of time. Students generated by the next five years of development will need to be



accommodated in District schools for a significant amount of time that could exceed twenty years. Thus, the District will need to ensure that it has facilities in place for future decades.

As evidenced by the State Building program's use of the criteria that buildings older than twenty-five years (and portables older than twenty years) are eligible for modernization funds, school buildings require reconstruction/modernization to remain in use for students beyond the initial twenty to twenty-five years of life of those buildings. To the extent that the District has buildings older than twenty to twenty-five years old, the point will be reached without reconstruction/modernization that those buildings will no longer be able to provide the existing level of service to students, and may, in some circumstances, need to be closed entirely for health and safety reasons. However, because of the new development, reconstruction/modernization must occur in order to have available school housing for the new students from development.

The following table shows the District's eligibility for modernization/reconstruction funding in the State Building Program.

This data is used to show that there are significant needs within the school District to invest in its existing facilities. Without modernizing its schools, the District could be forced to begin closing some of its buildings and schools.



To accurately account for the amount of the modernization projects attributed to the impact of new developments, only the students from new developments that were not already housed in new facilities are included in the net needs for modernization projects. As can be seen in the charts, the net modernization needs due to new development impacts are much less than the total District modernization needs.

Impact of New Residential Development

This next table compares the development-related enrollment to the available district capacity for each grade level and then multiplies the unhoused students by the new school construction costs to determine the total school facility costs related to the impact of new residential housing developments.

The modernization needs are included for the students not housed in new facilities but who would be housed in existing facilities that are eligible for and need to be modernized to provide adequate housing and to maintain the existing level of service for the students generated by development.

The total need for school facilities based solely on the impact of the 5 new housing units projected over the next five years totals \$91,102. To determine the impact per square foot of residential development, this amount is divided by the total square feet of the projected developments. As calculated from the historic Developer Fee Permits, the average size home built has averaged 1,917 square feet. The total area for 5 new homes would therefore be 9,585 square feet. The total residential fee needed to be able to collect \$91,102 would be **\$9.50** per square foot.

Impact of Other Residential Development

In addition to new residential development projects that typically include new single family homes and new multi-family units, the District can also be impacted by additional types of new development projects. These include but are not limited to redevelopment projects, additions to existing housing units, and replacement of existing housing units with new housing units.

These development projects are still residential projects and therefore it is reasonable to assume they would have the same monetary impacts per square foot as the new residential development projects. However, the net impact is reduced due to the fact that there was a previous residential building in its place. Therefore, the development impact fees should only be charged for other residential developments if the new building(s) exceed the square footage area of the previous building(s). If the new building is larger than the existing building, then it is reasonable to assume that additional students could be generated by the project. The project would only pay for the development impact fees for the net increase in assessable space generated by the development project. Education Code allows for an exemption from development impacts fees for any additions to existing residential structures that are 500 square feet or less.

Impact of Commercial/Industrial Development

There is a correlation between the growth of commercial/industrial firms/facilities within a community and the generation of school students within most business service areas. Fees for commercial/industrial can only be imposed if the residential fees will not fully mitigate the cost of providing school facilities to students from new development.

The approach utilized in this section is to apply statutory standards, U.S. Census employment statistics, and local statistics to determine the impact of future commercial/industrial development projects on the District. Many of the factors used in this analysis were taken from the U.S.



Census, which remains the most complete and authoritative source of information on the community in addition to the "1990 SanDAG Traffic Generators Report".

Employees per Square Foot of Commercial Development

Results from a survey published by the San Diego Association of Governments "1990 San DAG Traffic Generators" are used to establish numbers of employees per square foot of building area to be anticipated in new commercial or industrial development projects. The average number of workers per 1,000 square feet of area ranges from 0.06 for Rental Self Storage to 4.79 for Standard Commercial Offices. The generation factors from that report are shown in the following table.

Students per Employee

The number of students per employee is determined by using the 2015-2019 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates for the District. There were 1,450 employees and 1,073 homes in the District. This represents a ratio of 1.3514 employees per home.

There were 542 school age children attending the District in 2019. This is a ratio of 0.3738 students per employee. This ratio, however, must be reduced by including only the percentage of employees that worked in their community of residence (36.8%), because only those employees living in the District will impact the District's school facilities with their children. The net ratio of students per employee in the District is 0.1376.



School Facilities Cost per Student

Facility costs for housing commercially generated students are the same as those used for residential construction. The cost factors used to assess the impact from commercial development projects are contained in Table 11.

Residential Offset

When additional employees are generated in the District as a result of new commercial/ industrial development, fees will also be charged on the residential units necessary to provide housing for the employees living in the District. To prevent a commercial or industrial development from paying for the portion of the impact that will be covered by the residential fee, this amount has been calculated and deducted from each category. The residential offset amount is calculated by multiplying the following factors together and dividing by 1,000 (to convert from cost per 1,000 square feet to cost per square foot).

- Employees per 1,000 square feet (varies from a low of 0.06 for rental self storage to a high of 4.79 for office building).
- Percentage of employees that worked in their community of residence (36.8 percent).
- Housing units per employee (0.74). This was derived from the 2015-2019 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates data for the District, which indicates there were 1,450 employees, and the 2015-2019 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates data for the District, which indicates there were 1,073 housing units.
- Percentage of employees that will occupy new housing units (75 percent).
- Average square feet per dwelling unit (1,917).
- Residential fee charged by the District (\$3.19 (66.67% of \$4.79) per square foot).
- Average cost per student was determined in Table 11.

Net Cost per Square Foot

Since the State Maximum Fee is now \$0.52 (66.67% of \$0.78) for commercial/industrial construction, the District is justified in collecting the maximum fee for all categories with the exception of Rental Self Storage. The District can only justify collection of \$0.18 per square foot of Rental Self Storage construction.

Verifying the Sufficiency of the Development Impact

Education Code Section 17620 requires districts to find that fee revenues will not exceed the cost of providing school facilities to the students generated by the development paying the fees. This section shows that the fee revenues do not exceed the impact of the new development.

The total need for school facilities resulting from new development totals \$91,102. The amount the District would collect over the five year period at the maximum rate of \$3.19 (66.67% of \$4.79) for residential and \$0.52 (66.67% of \$0.78) for commercial/industrial development would be as follows:

\$3.19 x 5 homes x 1,917 sq ft per home = \$30,576 for Residential

\$0.52 x 19,002 sq ft per year x 5 years = \$49,405 for Commercial/Industrial


Total projected 5 year income: \$79,981

The estimated income is less than the projected facility needs due to the impact of new development projects.

Conclusion

Based on the data contained in this Study, it is found that a reasonable relationship exists between residential, commercial/industrial development and the need for school facilities in the Tipton Elementary School District. The following three nexus tests required to show justification for levying fees have been met:

<u>Burden Nexus:</u> New residential development will generate an average of 0.5051 TK-8 grade students per unit. Because the District does not have adequate facilities for all the students generated by new developments, the District will need to build additional facilities and/or modernize/reconstruct the existing facilities in order to maintain existing level of services in which the new students will be housed.

<u>Cost Nexus</u>: The cost to provide new and reconstructed facilities is an average of \$9.50 per square foot of residential development. Each square foot of residential development will generate \$3.19 (66.67% of \$4.79) in developer fees resulting in a shortfall of \$6.31 per square foot.

<u>Benefit Nexus</u>: The developer fees to be collected by the Tipton Elementary School District will be used for the provision of additional and reconstructed or modernized school facilities. This will benefit the students to be generated by new development by providing them with adequate educational school facilities.

The District's planned use of the fees received from development impacts will include the following types of projects, each of which will benefit students from new developments.

- New Schools: When there is enough development activity occurring in a single area, the District will build a new school to house the students from new developments.
- 2) Additions to Existing Schools: When infill development occurs, the District will accommodate students at existing schools by building needed classrooms and/or support facilities such as cafeterias, restrooms, gyms and libraries as needed to increase the school capacity. Schools may also need upgrades of the technology and tele-communication systems to be able to increase their capacity.



- 3) Portable Replacement Projects: Some of the District's capacity is in temporary portables and therefore may not be included in the State's capacity calculations. These portables can be replaced with new permanent or modular classrooms to provide adequate space for students from new developments. These projects result in an increase to the facility capacity according to State standards. In addition, old portables that have reached the end of their life expectancy, will need to be replaced to maintain the existing level of service. These types of projects are considered modernization projects in the State Building Program. If development impacts did not exist, the old portables could be removed.
- 4) Modernization/Upgrade Projects: In many cases, students from new developments are not located in areas where new schools are planned to be built. The District plans to modernize or upgrade older schools to be equivalent to new schools so students will be housed in equitable facilities to those students housed in new schools. These projects may include updates to the building structures to meet current building standards, along with upgrades to the current fire and safety standards and any access compliance standards.

Tipton Elementary School District will use the funds to assist with their State funded modernization projects.

Per the District's agreement with the High School District, the elementary share of the developer fees collected is 2/3rds or 66.67%. The reasonable relationship identified by these findings provides the required justification for the Tipton Elementary School District to levy the maximum fees of \$3.19 (66.67% of \$4.79) per square foot for residential construction and \$0.52 (66.67% of \$0.78) per square foot for commercial/industrial construction, except for Rental Self Storage facilities in which a fee of \$0.18 per square foot is justified as authorized by Education Code Section 17620.

- Any other purpose arising from the process of providing facilities for students generated by new development.

Following is an excerpt from the Education Code that states the valid uses of the Level 1 developer fees. It refers to construction and reconstruction. The term reconstruction was originally used in the Leroy Greene program. The term modernization is currently used in the 1998 State Building Program and represents the same scope of work used in the original reconstruction projects.

Ed Code Section 17620. (a) (1) The governing board of any school district is authorized to levy a fee, charge, dedication, or other requirement against any construction within the boundaries of the district, for the purpose of funding the construction or reconstruction of school facilities, subject to any limitations set forth in Chapter 4.9 (commencing with Section 65995) of Division 1 of Title 7 of the Government Code. This fee, charge, dedication, or other requirement may be applied to construction only as follows: ...

The limitations referred to in this text describe the maximum amounts that can be charged for residential and commercial/industrial projects and any projects that qualify for exemptions. They do not limit the use of the funds received.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER State Allocation Board Meeting, February 23, 2022

INDEX ADJUSTMENT ON THE ASSESSMENT FOR DEVELOPMENT

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To report the index adjustment on the assessment for development, which may be levied pursuant to Education Code Section 17620.

DESCRIPTION

The law requires the maximum assessment for development be adjusted every two years by the change in the Class B construction cost index, as determined by the State Allocation Board (Board) in each calendar year. This item requests that the Board make the adjustment based on the change reflected using the RS Means index.

<u>AUTHORITY</u>

Education Code Section 17620(a)(1) states the following: "The governing board of any school district is authorized to levy a fee, charge, dedication, or other requirement against any construction within the boundaries of the district, for the purpose of funding the construction or reconstruction of school facilities, subject to any limitations set forth in Chapter 4.9 (commencing with Section 65995) of Division 1 of Title 7 of the Government Code."

Government Code Section 65995(b)(3) states the following: "The amount of the limits set forth in paragraphs (1) and (2) shall be increased in 2000, and every two years thereafter, according to the adjustment for inflation set forth in the statewide cost index for class B construction, as determined by the State Allocation Board at its January meeting, which increase shall be effective as of the date of that meeting."

BACKGROUND

There are three levels that may be levied for developer's fees. The fees are levied on a per-square foot basis. The lowest fee, Level I, is assessed if the district conducts a Justification Study that establishes the connection between the development coming into the district and the assessment of fees to pay for the cost of the facilities needed to house future students. The Level II fee is assessed if a district makes a timely application to the Board for new construction funding, conducts a School Facility Needs Analysis pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.6, and satisfies at least two of the requirements listed in Government Code Section 65995.5(b)(3). The Level III fee is assessed when State bond funds are exhausted; the district may impose a developer's fee up to 100 percent of the School Facility Program new construction project cost.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

A historical comparison of the assessment rates for development fees for 2018 and 2020 are shown below for information. According to the RS Means, the cost index for Class B construction increased by 17.45% percent, during the two-year period from January 2020 to January 2022, requiring the assessment for development fees to be adjusted as follows beginning January 2022:

ANNUAL ADJUSTMENT TO SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM GRANTS

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To adopt the annual adjustment in the School Facility Program (SFP) grants based on the change in construction costs pursuant to the Education Code (EC) and SFP Regulations.

DESCRIPTION

This item presents the State Allocation Board (Board) with the annual adjustment to the SFP grants based on the statewide cost index for Class B construction. Each year the Board adjusts the SFP grants to reflect construction cost changes. In January 2016, the Board adopted the RS Means index for 2016 and future years. This item presents the 2022 annual adjustment to SFP grants based on the RS Means index.

AUTHORITY

See Attachment A.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

At the January 2016 meeting, the Board adopted an increase to the SFP grants using the RS Means Construction Cost Index (CCI) as the statewide cost index for Class B construction.

The current rate of change between 2021 and 2022 for the RS Means Class B CCI is 15.80 percent. The chart below reflects the amounts previously adopted for 2021 compared to the potential amount for the new construction base grants.

AUTHORITY

For the New Construction grant, EC Section 17072.10(b) states, "The board annually shall adjust the per-unhoused- pupil apportionment to reflect construction cost changes, as set forth in the statewide cost index for class B construction as determined by the board."

For Modernization funding, EC Section 17074.10(b) states, "The board shall annually adjust the factors set forth in subdivision (a) according to the adjustment for inflation set forth in the statewide cost index for class B construction, as determined by the board."

Government Code Section 66452.6 states:

(a)(1) An approved or conditionally approved tentative map shall expire 24 months after its approval or conditional approval, or after any additional period of time as may be prescribed by local ordinance, not to exceed an additional 12 months. However, if the subdivider is required to expend two hundred thirty-six thousand seven hundred ninety dollars (\$236,790) or more to construct, improve, or finance the construction or improvement of public improvements outside the property boundaries of the tentative map, excluding improvements of public rights-of-way which abut the boundary of the property to be subdivided and which are reasonably related to the development of that property, each filing of a final map authorized by Section 66456.1 shall extend the expiration of the approved or conditionally approved tentative map by 36 months from the date of its expiration, as provided in this section, or the date of the previously filed final map, whichever is later. The extensions shall not extend the tentative map more than 10 years from its approval or conditional approval.

(2) Commencing January 1, 2012, and each calendar year thereafter, the amount of two hundred thirty-six thousand seven hundred ninety dollars (\$236,790) shall be annually increased by operation of law according to the adjustment for inflation set forth in the statewide cost index for class B construction, as determined by the State Allocation Board at its January meeting. The effective date of each annual adjustment shall be March 1. The adjusted amount shall apply to tentative and vesting tentative maps whose applications were received after the effective date of the adjustment.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.71 states,

The new construction per-unhoused-pupil grant amount, as provided by Education Code Section 17072.10(a), will be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January. The base Class B Construction Cost Index shall be 1.30 and the first adjustment shall be January, 1999.

The new construction per-unhoused-pupil grant amount, as provided by Education Code Section 17072.10(a), may be increased by an additional amount not to exceed six percent in a fiscal year, or decreased, based on the analysis of the current cost to build schools as reported on the Project Information Worksheet (Revised 05/10) which shall be submitted with the Forms SAB 50-05 and 50-06 and as approved by the Board.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.2 Definitions states,

"Class B Construction Cost Index" is a construction factor index for structures made of reinforced concrete or steel frames, concrete floors, and roofs, and accepted and used by the Board.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.78 states, "The modernization per-unhoused-pupil grant amount, as provided by Education Code Section 17074.10(a), will be adjusted annually based on the change in the Class B Construction Cost Index as approved by the Board each January.

RESOLUTION NO.2021-2022-08

WHEREAS, Education Code section 17620 et seq. and Government Code section 65995, authorize the governing board of any school district to levy a fee, charge, dedication, or other form of requirement (hereinafter "fee" or "fees"), in the maximum amounts specified therein, against residential, commercial and industrial development projects occurring within the boundaries of the district (hereinafter "development"), for the purpose of funding the construction or reconstruction of school facilities; and

WHEREAS, this Board has previously resolved to levy fees on development projects pursuant to this authority; and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 65995 provides that the maximum fees which may be levied on development projects shall be increased in 2000 and every two years thereafter according to the adjustment for inflation set forth in the statewide cost index for Class B construction as determined by the State Allocation Board "SAB" and to become effective at its January meeting; and

WHEREAS, the SAB at its February 23, 2022 meeting, set the maximum fee to \$4.79 per square foot for residential development and to \$0.78 per square foot for commercial/industrial development; and

WHEREAS, the new Fees are an increase of what is currently being collected by Tipton Elementary School District. A copy of the Study is attached hereto, marked Exhibit "A," and incorporated herein by this reference; and

WHEREAS, in the judgment of this Board it is necessary and appropriate, and in the best interests of the District and its students, to levy fees for the purpose of funding the construction or reconstruction of school facilities necessary to serve the students generated by new development occurring within the District;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, ORDERED AND FOUND by this Board as follows:

1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

2. This Board approves and adopts the Study and recommendation of the District Superintendent, or designee, to levy fees in the maximum amounts authorized on new residential, commercial and industrial development that occurs within the District, and based upon the Study and recommendations, and upon all other written and oral information presented to this Board concerning this matter, makes the following findings:

A. The purpose of the fees is to finance the construction and reconstruction of school facilities in order to provide adequate school facilities for the students of the District who will be generated by new residential and commercial/industrial development taking place in the District;

B. The construction or reconstruction of school facilities is necessary to create updated, adequate, appropriate classroom space and academic support facilities for the following reasons:

(1) New residential and commercial and industrial development is projected to occur within the District within the next five years which will generate school-aged children;

(2) Students projected from new development will impact and increase the need of the District to create updated, adequate, appropriate classroom space and academic support facilities.

(3) Existing school facilities in the District are in need of, or will be in need of, reconstruction or modernization. New development will generate students who will attend District schools and be housed in existing facilities. These students cannot be housed without upgrading existing school facilities, ultimately making reconstruction or modernization of such facilities necessary;

(4) Both existing students and new students generated by future development occurring within the district will need to be housed and served in existing school facilities, as well as new and additional school facilities necessary to serve the projected student population.

(5) As commercial and industrial development occurs, new jobs are created. Many of the people hired for these jobs move into the community, thereby increasing the need for residential development which generates additional students adding to the impact on the school facilities of the District. The maximum fee that can be levied against residential development is insufficient to cover the full cost of the new or reconstructed school facilities needed by the district to house students generated from new residential development, and therefore justifies a separate fee against commercial and industrial development in the maximum amount allowed by law.

C. Without the addition of new school facilities and/or the reconstruction and modernization of existing facilities, the District will be unable to adequately house and serve additional students generated by new development which will impair or adversely impact the normal functioning of educational programs and services of the District;

D. The District has no, or limited revenue sources available for funding the construction or reconstruction of school facilities attributable to new development;

E. The fees adopted herein bear a reasonable relationship to the need for, and the estimated cost of, the construction or reconstruction of school facilities attributable to the type of new development on which the fees will be imposed;

F. The cost of providing for the construction and/or reconstruction of school facilities attributable to the type of new development occurring in the District will exceed the revenues reasonably anticipated from fees;

G. Existing students will benefit from the use of developer fees for new school facilities. Conversely, students generated from new development will occupy existing school facilities and will benefit from the use of fees to reconstruct or modernize those facilities. Therefore, it is appropriate to use developer fees for existing facilities to the extent of the estimated use of such facilities by students generated by new development.

3. Based on the foregoing, this Board hereby determines:

A. To levy a fee on any new or on other residential development, as described in Education Code § 17620(a), occurring within the District, in the maximum amount currently authorized by law of \$3.19 per square foot of assessable space as such space is defined in

Government Code § 65995(b)(1). (This represents the elementary share of the \$4.79 total residential fee).

B. To levy a fee on categories of new commercial or industrial development, as described in Education Code § 17620(a), occurring within the boundaries of the District, in the maximum amount currently authorized by law of \$0.52 per square foot of chargeable covered and enclosed space as such space is defined in Government Code § 65995(b)(2), (this represents the elementary share of the \$0.78 total commercial/industrial fee). except for Rental Self-Storage projects in which a fee of \$0.18 per square foot is justified.

4. The fee provisions of this Resolution are not exclusive, and this Board specifically reserves authority to undertake other or additional methods to finance school facilities in partial or complete substitution for, or in conjunction with, the fee provisions set forth therein, as authorized by law. This Board reserves the authority, in its discretion, to substitute the dedication of land or other form of requirement in lieu of fees to be levied pursuant to this Resolution.

5. The District intends to utilize fees for new construction of school facilities, reconstruction or modernization of existing facilities, purchase, lease or lease-purchase of portable or relocatable classrooms and related facilities as interim school facilities to house students pending the construction of permanent facilities, or the purchase, lease or lease-purchase of land for school facilities. This includes all associated costs to plan and execute school facilities projects including, but not limited to, architectural and engineering costs, testing and inspection costs, permits and plan checking, and other administrative costs related to the provision of school facilities. Construction, reconstruction or modernization of school facilities includes, but is not limited to, classrooms and equipment and furnishings for classrooms, and all other reasonable and customary auxiliary, accessory, adjunct, or other supportive facilities for classrooms such as restrooms, gymnasiums, administrative offices, cafeterias, libraries, multipurpose rooms, maintenance and storage rooms, walkways, overhangs, parking lots, landscaping, and all other similar facilities. Finally, fees may be used for studies and reports necessary to make the findings and determinations required by law for the collection of fees which may include the school facilities needs analysis described in Government Code section 65995.6, for reimbursement of administrative costs to collect fees, and for such other purposes consistent with

the purpose and intent of this Resolution, or authorized by law, or deemed necessary or appropriate by this governing board.

6. The Superintendent, or designee, is authorized to certify compliance of a particular development project with the fee or other requirement levied by this Board, or to certify where appropriate that a project is fully or partially exempt from fees in appropriate circumstances. Any certification of compliance for a particular residential construction project is expressly conditioned upon the continued satisfaction by that project of the requirements for that certification and failure to meet those requirements in the future may result in the revocation of such certification and enforcement of the appropriate fee requirement for the project.

7. Pursuant to Education Code § 17621(c), this board determines that the fee levied on residential development is not subject to the restrictions set forth in subdivision (a) of Government Code § 66007 and, pursuant to Education Code § 17620(b), shall be collected at the time of issuance of the building or similar permit required for a particular development project.

8. Pursuant to Government Code section 66001(d), the Superintendent or the District's designee shall review the Fund established pursuant to this Resolution for the fifth fiscal year following the first deposit of fees in the Fund, and every five years thereafter, and with respect to any portion of a fee remaining unspent five or more years after deposit, the Superintendent or the District's designee shall report to this Board which shall either make the findings required by section 66001(d) for said unspent fees, or direct the refund of such fees in the manner provided in 66001(e) and (f).

9. Pursuant to Government Code section 66001(e), the Superintendent or designee, shall advise this board whenever it appears sufficient fees have been collected to complete financing on incomplete public improvements that have been identified in the Study. This board shall then make a determination whether or not sufficient fees have been collected for a particular project, and when a determination is made by this board that sufficient fees have been collected, this Board shall identify, within 180 days of the determination, an approximate date by which the construction of the public improvement will be commenced, or shall refund the fees as provided in said section, unless the provisions of section 66001(f) are deemed to apply.

10. The fees adopted herein are effective sixty (60) days after the approval of this Resolution unless the School Board states this is an urgency due to the significant needs and

impacts of the impending new housing developments and there is a 4/5ths majority vote, to cause that the imposition of fees shall take effect thirty (30) days after the date of this Resolution.

11. The Superintendent or the District's designee is hereby authorized and directed to do the following:

A. As required by Government Code § 66006(a), to establish a separate capital facilities fund (herein "Fund") into which the fees received by the District shall be deposited and shall not be commingled with other revenues and funds of the District. The fees, and any interest earned thereon, shall be expended only for the purpose of funding the construction or reconstruction of school facilities or such other purposes as are permitted by law and authorized by this Board.

B. If applicable, negotiate agreements with other school district(s) with common territorial boundaries ensuring that the total fees collected by each school district does not exceed the maximum fees allowed by law for residential and commercial and industrial development and providing for an equitable division of the fees with such other school district(s). As required by Education Code section § 17623(a), copies of such agreement(s) shall be transmitted to the State Allocation Board, and shall also be sent to any county or city planning agency which is calculating or collecting fees on behalf of the District.

C. Take such further action as is necessary or appropriate to carry out the purpose and intent of this Resolution.

4.5 Addendum to Memorandum of Understanding Between Tipton Elementary School and Associated Teachers of Tipton CTA/NEA – Summer 2021-2022 – Learning Loss/Intervention Program

ADDENDUM TO MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN TIPTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT AND ASSOCIATED TEACHERS OF TIPTON CTA/NEA

SUMMER 2021-2022- LEARNING LOSS/INTERVENTION PROGRAM

The Tipton Elementary School District ("District") and the Associated Teachers of Tipton, CTA/NEA ("Association") (collectively referred to as the "Parties") enter into this Addendum ("Addendum") to the Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU"), dated April 30, 2021, which is attached and incorporated herein as Exhibit "A".

The MOU and this Addendum are intended to reflect the Parties' agreement to provide voluntary intervention instruction following the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years and tutoring/Saturday school services during the 2021-2022 school year to address student learning loss due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The MOU states, "All future summer programs shall be paid consistent with the terms of the collective bargaining agreement, however, the Parties agree to discuss a potential increase to the rate of pay for the 2021-2022 summer school program, if offered, contingent on the continued availability of AB 86 funds." Consistent with this language, the Parties wish to address the rate of pay for the 2021-2022 summer school program through this Addendum.

Consistent with California Assembly Bill ("AB") 86 and the District's Expanded Learning Opportunity Plan, the Parties recognize the importance of addressing potential learning loss experienced by District students due to the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as to provide additional learning intervention beyond the school year. Therefore, in addition to offering focused, voluntary, in-person intervention instruction during the summer of 2021 and tutoring/Saturday school opportunities during the 2021-2022 school year, the Parties agree to offer in-person intervention instruction during the summer of 2022 to address potential learning loss.

The language in this Addendum shall supplement and replace language in the MOU as set forth below. Unless otherwise noted below, all other terms of the MOU shall remain unchanged and in full effect.

The Parties agree to the following:

Recitals

1. The Parties agree the recitals set forth above are true and correct.

• 2021-2022 Summer Intervention Program

- 1. A new section entitled "2021-2022 Summer Intervention Program" shall be added to include the following language:
 - 2021-2022 Summer Intervention Program

- 1. The 2021-2022 Summer Intervention Program shall begin June 7, 2022, [with the first day of instruction on June 8, 2022,] and shall continue through June 24, 2022. Instruction during the 2021-2022 Summer Intervention Program shall be provided through in-person instruction.
- 2. Bargaining unit members shall work five (5) hours per day during the 2021-2022 Summer Intervention Program. Bargaining unit members shall complete a time sheet representing all dates and hours worked (including any hours of absence). Payment for time work shall be contingent on completion of this time sheet.
- 3. Pursuant to the continued availability of AB 86 and other applicable funds, bargaining unit members providing instruction during the 2021-2022 Summer Intervention Program shall be compensated at a rate of sixty-five dollars (\$65.00) per hour. This rate of pay shall only apply to the 2021-2022 Summer Intervention Program and shall not be precedent setting, nor create a past practice. All future summer programs shall be paid consistent with the terms of the collective bargaining agreement between the Parties.

Miscellaneous

- 1. The Parties represent that they have read and understand the terms of this Addendum and are authorized to execute this Addendum on behalf of its members. Copies of signatures shall have the same force and effect as original signatures. Facsimile and electronic signatures shall be deemed original signatures.
- 2. The MOU, together with the Addendum, shall expire on June 30, 2022, unless extended or modified by mutual written agreement.
- 3. The Parties agree that this Addendum, together with the MOU, shall not be precedent setting, nor constitute a past practice.
- 4. Neither the Association nor the District makes any representations, warranties or guarantees regarding any tax and/or retirement consequences related to this Addendum.
- 5. Nothing in this Addendum shall prevent the District from following all requirements of law. If the District learns that compliance with this Addendum puts funding that the District has received or additional funding the District could receive, in jeopardy or conflicts with any Health Directives, then the District shall consult with the Association regarding how best to ensure full state funding and legal compliance.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN TIPTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT AND ASSOCIATED TEACHERS OF TIPTON CTA/NEA

SUMMER 2020-2021 AND 2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR- LEARNING LOSS/INTERVENTION PROGRAM

The Tipton Elementary School District ("District") and the Associated Teacher of Tipton, CTA/NEA ("Association") (collectively referred to as the "Parties") enter into this Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") to provide voluntary intervention instruction during the three weeks following the 2020-2021 school year, in lieu of traditional summer school, and tutoring/Saturday school services during the 2021-2022 school year to address student learning loss due to the pandemic. This MOU is dated April 30, 2021 for reference purposes.

On March 5, 2021, Governor Newsom approved California Assembly Bill ("AB") 86; a budget bill addressing COVID-19 relief and school reopening with the inclusion of In-Person Instruction and Expanded Learning Opportunity Grants. Specifically, the Expanded Learning Opportunity Grants are intended to be used for activities that directly support academic achievement and mitigate learning loss related to COVID-19 school closures.

Consistent with AB 86, the Parties recognize the importance of addressing potential learning loss experienced by District students during the 2020-2021 school year, as well as to provide additional learning intervention beyond the school year. Therefore, the Parties agree to offer focused, voluntary, in-person intervention instruction during the summer of 2021, in lieu of traditional summer school ("Summer Learning Intervention Program"). The Parties also agree to provide tutoring services and Saturday school opportunities to District students to address potential learning loss experienced during the 2020-2021 school year.

The Parties agree to the following:

- Recitals
 - 1. The Parties agree the recitals set forth above are true and correct.
- Terms of Collective Bargaining Agreement
 - 1. All terms of the current collective bargaining agreement between the Parties shall remain in full effect except as stated and modified in this MOU. If there is a conflict, this MOU shall prevail.
- 2020-2021 Summer Learning Intervention Program
 - 1. The Summer Learning Intervention Program shall begin June 7, 2021, with the first day of instruction on June 8, 2021, and shall continue through June 25, 2021. Instruction during the Summer Learning Intervention Program shall be provided **in-person only**.
 - 2. Employees shall work five (5) hours per day during the Summer Intervention Program. Employees shall complete a time sheet representing all dates and hours worked (including

any hours of absence). Payment for time worked shall be contingent on completion of this time sheet.

3. Bargaining Unit members providing instruction during the Summer Learning Intervention Program shall be compensated at a rate of sixty dollars (\$60.00) per hour. This rate of pay shall only apply to the 2020-2021 Summer Learning Intervention Program and shall not be precedent setting, nor create a past practice. All future summer programs shall be paid consistent with the terms of the collective bargaining agreement, however, the Parties agree to discuss a potential increase to the rate of pay for the 2021-2022 summer school program, if offered, contingent on the continued availability of AB 86 funds.

2021-2022 School Year Tutoring/Saturday School

- Students will be offered tutoring and Saturday school opportunities throughout the 2021-2022 school year to address potential learning loss experienced during the 2020-2021 school year.
- 2. These voluntary instructional opportunities, as scheduled by the District, will be offered to employees and assigned by the District on a first-come-first serve basis, with consideration of the employee's current grade level, consistent with past practices.
- 3. The District shall retain the right to determine the number of employees authorized to perform these services on any scheduled day, for reasons including, but not limited to, student participation rates.
- 4. The rate of pay for these services performed during the 2021-2022 school year shall be sixty dollars (\$60.00) per hour. Employees shall complete a time sheet representing all dates and hours worked. Payment for time worked shall be contingent on completion of this time sheet and prior written authorization by the District to perform said services. This rate of pay shall only apply to these services performed during the 2021-2022 school year and shall not be precedent setting, nor create a past practice. Services performed in future school years shall be paid consistent with the terms of the collective bargaining agreement.

Miscellaneous

- 1. The Parties represent that they have read and understand the terms of this MOU and are authorized to execute this MOU on behalf of its members. Copies of signatures shall have the same force and effect as original signatures. Facsimile and electronic signatures shall be deemed original signatures.
- 2. This MOU shall expire on June 30, 2022, unless extended or modified by mutual written agreement.
- 3. The Parties agree that this MOU is not precedent setting and does not constitute a past practice.
- 4. Neither the Association nor the District makes any representations, warranties or guarantees regarding any tax and/or retirement consequences related to this MOU.

5. Nothing in this MOU shall prevent the District from following all requirements of law. If the District learns that compliance with this MOU puts funding that the District has received or additional funding the District could receive, in jeopardy or conflicts with any Health Directives, then the District shall consult with the Association regarding how best to ensure full state funding and legal compliance.

No district employee shall be discriminated against or harassed by any coworker, supervisor, manager, or other person with whom the employee comes in contact in the course of employment, on the basis of the employee's actual or perceived race, color, ancestry, national origin, age, religious creed, marital status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, veteran or military status, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

The district shall not inquire into any employee's immigration status nor discriminate against an employee on the basis of immigration status, unless there is clear and convincing evidence that the district is required to do so in order to comply with federal immigration law. (2 CCR 11028)

Discrimination in employment based on the characteristics listed above is prohibited in all areas of employment and in all employment-related practices, including the following:

- 1. Hiring, compensation, terms, conditions, and other privileges of employment
- 2. Taking of adverse employment actions such as termination or denial of employment, promotion, job assignment, or training
- 3. Unwelcome conduct, whether verbal, physical, or visual, that is so severe or pervasive as to adversely affect an employee's employment opportunities or that has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with the employee's work performance or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work environment
- 4. Actions and practices identified as unlawful or discriminatory pursuant to Government Code 12940 or 2 CCR 11006-11086, such as:
 - a. Sex discrimination based on an employee's pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding, or any related medical condition or on an employee's gender, gender expression, or gender identity, including transgender status
 - b. Religious creed discrimination based on an employee's religious belief or observance, including religious dress or grooming practices, or based on the district's failure or refusal to use reasonable means to accommodate an employee's religious belief, observance, or practice which conflicts with an employment requirement
 - c. Requiring medical or psychological examination of a job applicant or making an inquiry into whether a job applicant has a mental or physical disability or a medical condition or as to the severity of any such disability or condition, without the showing of a job-related need or business necessity

Status: ADOPTED

d. Failure to make reasonable accommodation for the known physical or mental disability of an employee or to engage in a timely, good faith, interactive process with an employee who has requested such accommodations in order to determine the effective reasonable accommodations, if any, to be provided to the employee

The Board also prohibits retaliation against any district employee who opposes any discriminatory employment practice by the district or its employees, agents, or representatives or who complains, reports an incident, testifies, assists, or in any way participates in the district's complaint process pursuant to this policy. No employee who requests an accommodation for any protected characteristic listed in this policy shall be subjected to any punishment or sanction, regardless of whether the request was granted. (Government Code 12940; 2 CCR 11028)

No employee shall, in exchange for a raise or bonus or as a condition of employment or continued employment, be required to sign a release of the employee's claim or right to file a claim against the district or a nondisparagement agreement or other document that has the purpose or effect of preventing the employee from disclosing information about harassment, discrimination, or other unlawful acts in the workplace, including any conduct that the employee has reasonable cause to believe is unlawful. (Government Code 12964.5)

Complaints concerning employment discrimination, harassment, or retaliation shall immediately be investigated in accordance with procedures specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. Any supervisory or management employee who observes or has knowledge of an incident of prohibited discrimination or harassment, including harassment of an employee by a nonemployee, shall report the incident to the Superintendent or designated district coordinator as soon as practical after the incident. All other employees are encouraged to report such incidents to their supervisor immediately.

The Superintendent or designee shall use all appropriate means to reinforce the district's nondiscrimination policy, including providing training and information to employees about how to recognize harassment, discrimination, or other prohibited conduct, how to respond appropriately, and components of the district's policies and regulations regarding discrimination. The Superintendent or designee shall regularly review the district's employment practices and, as necessary, shall take action to ensure district compliance with the nondiscrimination laws.

Any district employee who engages in prohibited discrimination, harassment, or retaliation or who aids, abets, incites, compels, or coerces another to engage or attempt to engage in such behavior in violation of this policy shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

The district shall maintain and preserve all applications, personnel, membership, or employment referral records and files for at least four years after the records are initially created or received or, for an applicant or a terminated employee, for four years after the date the employment action was taken. However, when the district is notified that a complaint has been filed with the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing, records related to the employee involved shall be maintained and preserved until the later of the first date after the time for filing a civil action has expired or the first date after the complaint has been fully and finally disposed of and all administrative proceedings, civil actions, appeals, or related proceedings have been terminated. (Government Code 12946)

Policy 4141.6: Concerted Action/Work Stoppage

Status: ADOPTED

Original Adopted Date: 12/01/1989 | Last Revised Date: 03/2022 | Last Reviewed Date: 03/2022

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of maintaining ongoing positive relations with employees and engaging in fair, respectful negotiations with employee organizations. The Board desires to reach agreement on employment contracts in a manner that prevents disruption to school operations and minimizes impact on student achievement.

The Board recognizes that advance planning is necessary to ensure that, in the event of a work stoppage, strike, or other concerted employee activity, students continue to receive educational services to which they are entitled. The Superintendent or designee shall develop a written plan which shall include strategies for the provision of internal and external communications, preservation of student and staff safety, maintenance of district operations, and appropriate student instruction and supervision during a work slowdown or stoppage.

If an employee organization gives notice that it intends to strike, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the Public Employment Relations Board, Employment Development Department, employees in the striking unit, other district employees, parents/guardians, students, law enforcement, the media, and others as appropriate.

Employees should be held accountable for their behavior during any labor dispute. The district may take disciplinary action against any employee who engages in an unlawful concerted action or in unlawful behavior in an otherwise protected activity, taking into account the seriousness of the behavior and the district's efforts to rebuild relations following the withholding of services by employees.

Regulation 4141.6: Concerted Action/Work Stoppage

Status: ADOPTED

Maintenance of District Operations

During any work stoppage, strike, or other concerted employee activity, the Superintendent or designee shall take measures to minimize disruption to district operations and student learning. At the discretion of the Superintendent or designee, employees reporting for duty may be temporarily assigned to other duties. In addition, the Superintendent or designee may hire qualified substitute and/or temporary employees as needed to maintain district operations and shall recommend to the Governing Board an appropriate rate of pay for such employees for the period of the work stoppage.

Strike Plan

The Superintendent or designee may establish a committee to develop a plan in the event of a work stoppage. This committee may include district-level staff, legal counsel, the district's negotiator and parents/guardians.

The strike plan shall address, at a minimum, the following elements:

- 1. Roles and responsibilities during a work stoppage, including roles of the Board, Superintendent, district-level staff, legal counsel, principals, certificated or classified staff when they are not participating in the strike, substitutes and other employees
- 2. Criteria for keeping schools open during a work stoppage, including potential costs, availability of qualified substitutes or other staffing, and the ability to maintain essential services and to ensure the safety of students and staff
- 3. Maintenance of the educational program, including availability of lesson plans and instructional materials, alternatives for handling special education and other programs as appropriate
- 4. Internal communications among district staff and the Board during a work stoppage
- 5. Plans for obtaining and paying for the services of and communicating with temporary or substitute employees
- 6. Status of district-paid benefits, including health care, insurance, vacation and sick leave benefits
- 7. Communications with parents/guardians, the media, business partners, public officials and other community members that identify key messages, strategies and district spokespersons
- 8. Equipment and supply needs
- 9. Desirability and feasibility of conducting extracurricular activities during a work stoppage including an analysis of the number of events and activities that would be affected, the availability of staffing, the degree of student and/or community participation and the ability to provide adequate security at events

- 10. Contingency plans for transportation
- 11. Contingency plans for the provision of food services
- 12. Identification of outside resources who may be called upon to help with school operations
- 13. Coordination with law enforcement and other agencies
- 14. Appropriate safeguards for the safety of students, working employees, substitutes, volunteers, parent/guardians and Board members
- 15. Provisions for safe, effective board meetings
- 16. Cost estimates for the various strategies to be implemented during a work stoppage
- 17. Legal remedies available to enjoin the work stoppage if possible or to file unfair labor practice charges against the employee organization
- 18. Continuation of negotiations during a work stoppage
- 19. Plans for resuming normal district operations, rebuilding relations and disciplining employees if necessary after the work stoppage

Activities of Employees

The district shall not impose or threaten to impose reprisals, discriminate or threaten to discriminate, or otherwise interfere with, restrain or coerce employees for the exercise of their rights. (Government Code 3543.5-3543.6)

Employees engaging in a work stoppage shall not prevent access to school facilities by other employees, substitutes or students; use or threaten physical violence or bodily injury; trespass; distribute malicious or defamatory leaflets or materials; or otherwise coerce or intimidate individuals in the conduct of school business.

During an actual or threatened work stoppage, an employee shall not retain any district property, including but not limited to student attendance and grading records, lesson plans, keys, equipment and supplies.

Employees shall not use students to distribute messages that promote or explain the position of any employee organization that is contemplating or engaged in a work stoppage. In addition, employees shall not use classroom or other duty time to promote an employee organization's position in negotiations or in a work stoppage.

When students raise questions related to a work stoppage, teachers shall approach the subject in accordance with the district's policy on controversial issues and shall not allow such discussions to interfere with their regular teaching responsibilities.

Salary and Benefits

Employees withholding services shall not receive salary or unemployment benefits during the period of the work stoppage.

Any employee withholding services may be subject to the loss of payroll deduction privileges.

Throughout the duration of any enrolled employee's participation in an authorized strike, the district shall not fail or refuse to maintain and pay for the employee's continued health care or other medical coverage or the coverage of their enrolled dependents, nor shall the district fail to collect and remit the employee's contributions to any such coverage. The district shall maintain the coverage at the same level and under the same conditions that the coverage would have been provided if the employee had continued to work in the employee's position for the duration of the strike. Health care or other medical coverage for this purpose includes coverage for medical, dental, vision, behavioral health, disability, accidental death and dismemberment, life, and supplemental health insurance benefits. (Government Code 3141-3142)

"Authorized strike" means a strike sanctioned by the central labor council or the membership of an employee organization that represents the striking employees, or one that is engaged in by unrepresented employees. (Government Code 3141)

Employees whose vacation leave has been authorized prior to the work stoppage shall receive vacation pay for the authorized period.

If an employee is on a paid sick or disability leave when the work stoppage begins, the employee shall be entitled to continued payment as long as the employee remains ill or disabled and is otherwise eligible according to Board policy and collective bargaining agreements.

The Superintendent or designee may determine that credit shall not be applied toward probationary service, salary schedule advancement, permanent status, vacation earnings, retirement credit or sick leave accrual during the period of time that employees withhold services.

Regulation 4241.6: Concerted Action/Work Stoppage

Status: ADOPTED

Original Adopted Date: 12/01/1989 | Last Revised Date: 03/2022 | Last Reviewed Date: 03/2022

Maintenance of District Operations

During any work stoppage, strike, or other concerted employee activity, the Superintendent or designee shall take measures to minimize disruption to district operations and student learning. At the discretion of the Superintendent or designee, employees reporting for duty may be temporarily assigned to other duties. In addition, the Superintendent or designee may hire qualified substitute and/or temporary employees as needed to maintain district operations and shall recommend to the Governing Board an appropriate rate of pay for such employees for the period of the work stoppage.

Strike Plan

The Superintendent or designee may establish a committee to develop a plan in the event of a work stoppage. This committee may include district-level staff, legal counsel, the district's negotiator and parents/guardians.

The strike plan shall address, at a minimum, the following elements:

- 1. Roles and responsibilities during a work stoppage, including roles of the Board, Superintendent, district-level staff, legal counsel, principals, certificated or classified staff when they are not participating in the strike, substitutes and other employees
- 2. Criteria for keeping schools open during a work stoppage, including potential costs, availability of qualified substitutes or other staffing, and the ability to maintain essential services and to ensure the safety of students and staff
- 3. Maintenance of the educational program, including availability of lesson plans and instructional materials, alternatives for handling special education and other programs as appropriate
- 4. Internal communications among district staff and the Board during a work stoppage
- 5. Plans for obtaining and paying for the services of and communicating with temporary or substitute employees
- 6. Status of district-paid benefits, including health care, insurance, vacation and sick leave benefits
- 7. Communications with parents/guardians, the media, business partners, public officials and other community members that identify key messages, strategies and district spokespersons
- 8. Equipment and supply needs
- 9. Desirability and feasibility of conducting extracurricular activities during a work stoppage including an analysis of the number of events and activities that would be affected, the availability of staffing, the degree of student and/or community participation and the ability to provide adequate security at events

- 10. Contingency plans for transportation
- 11. Contingency plans for the provision of food services
- 12. Identification of outside resources who may be called upon to help with school operations
- 13. Coordination with law enforcement and other agencies
- 14. Appropriate safeguards for the safety of students, working employees, substitutes, volunteers, parent/guardians and Board members
- 15. Provisions for safe, effective board meetings
- 16. Cost estimates for the various strategies to be implemented during a work stoppage
- 17. Legal remedies available to enjoin the work stoppage if possible or to file unfair labor practice charges against the employee organization
- 18. Continuation of negotiations during a work stoppage
- 19. Plans for resuming normal district operations, rebuilding relations and disciplining employees if necessary after the work stoppage

Activities of Employees

The district shall not impose or threaten to impose reprisals, discriminate or threaten to discriminate, or otherwise interfere with, restrain or coerce employees for the exercise of their rights. (Government Code 3543.5-3543.6)

Employees engaging in a work stoppage shall not prevent access to school facilities by other employees, substitutes or students; use or threaten physical violence or bodily injury; trespass; distribute malicious or defamatory leaflets or materials; or otherwise coerce or intimidate individuals in the conduct of school business.

During an actual or threatened work stoppage, an employee shall not retain any district property, including but not limited to student attendance and grading records, lesson plans, keys, equipment and supplies.

Employees shall not use students to distribute messages that promote or explain the position of any employee organization that is contemplating or engaged in a work stoppage. In addition, employees shall not use classroom or other duty time to promote an employee organization's position in negotiations or in a work stoppage.

Salary and Benefits

Employees withholding services shall not receive salary or unemployment benefits during the period of the work stoppage.

Any employee withholding services may be subject to the loss of payroll deduction privileges.

Throughout the duration of any enrolled employee's participation in an authorized strike, the district shall not fail or refuse to maintain and pay for the employee's continued health care or other medical coverage or the coverage of their enrolled dependents, nor shall the district fail to collect and remit the employee's contributions to any such coverage. Policy 5111: Admission

Original Adopted Date: 04/01/2015 | Last Revised Date: 03/2022 | Last Reviewed Date: 03/2022

The Governing Board encourages the enrollment and appropriate placement of all children who are eligible for enrollment in school. The Superintendent or designee shall inform parents/guardians of children seeking admission to a district school about admission requirements and shall assist them with enrollment procedures.

The Superintendent or designee shall announce and publicize the timeline and process for registration of students at district schools. Applications for intradistrict or interdistrict enrollment shall be subject to the timelines specified in applicable Board policies and administrative regulations.

All appropriate staff shall receive training on district admission policies and procedures, including information regarding the types of documentation that can and cannot be requested.

Verification of Admission Eligibility

Before enrolling any child in a district school, the Superintendent or designee shall verify the child's age, residence within the district, immunization, and other applicable eligibility criteria specified in law, the accompanying administrative regulation, or other applicable Board policy or administrative regulation.

The district shall not inquire into or request documentation of a student's social security number or the last four digits of the social security number or the citizenship or immigration status of the student or the student's family members. (Education Code 234.7, 49076.7)

However, such information may be collected when required by state or federal law or to comply with requirements for special state or federal programs. In any such situation, the information shall be collected separately from the school enrollment process and the Superintendent or designee shall explain the limited purpose for which the information is collected. Enrollment in a district school shall not be denied on the basis of any such information of the student or the student's parents/guardians obtained by the district, or the student's or parent/guardian's refusal to provide such information to the district.

School registration information shall list all possible means of documenting a child's age for entry into grades K-1 as authorized by Education Code 48002 or otherwise prescribed by the Board. Any

alternative document allowed by the district shall be one that all persons can obtain regardless of immigration status, citizenship status, or national origin and shall not reveal information related to citizenship or immigrant status.

The Superintendent or designee shall immediately enroll a homeless student, foster youth, student who has had contact with the juvenile justice system, or a child of a military family regardless of outstanding fees or fines owed to the student's last school, lack of clothing normally required by the school, such as school uniforms, or an inability to produce previous academic, medical, or other records normally required for enrollment. (Education Code 48645.5, 48850, 48852.7, 48853.5, 49701; 42 USC 11432)

Regulation 5111: Admission

Age of Admittance to Transitional Kindergarten, Kindergarten and First Grade

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall enroll any eligible child whose fifth or sixth birthday is on or before September 1 of that year into kindergarten or first grade, as applicable. (Education Code 48000, 48010)

Admission into transitional kindergarten shall be in accordance with law and as specified in BP 6170.1 -Transitional Kindergarten. (Education Code 48000)

On a case-by-case basis, and with the approval of the child's parent/guardian, a child who will turn five years old in a given school year may be enrolled in kindergarten at any time during that school year provided that: (Education Code 48000)

- 1. The Governing Board determines that admittance is in the best interest of the child.
- 2. The parent/guardian is given information regarding the advantages and disadvantages and any other explanatory information about the effect of this early admittance.

The Superintendent or designee shall make a recommendation to the Board regarding whether a child should be granted early entry to kindergarten, as appropriate. In doing so, the Superintendent or designee shall consider various factors including the availability of classroom space and any negotiated maximum class size.

Documentation of Age/Grade

Prior to the admission of a child to kindergarten or first grade, the parent/guardian shall present proof of the child's age. (Education Code 48002) Evidence of the child's age may include: (Education Code 48002)

- 1. A certified copy of a birth certificate or a statement by the local registrar or county recorder certifying the date of birth
- 2. A duly attested baptism certificate
- 3. A passport
- 4. When none of the above documents is obtainable, an affidavit of the parent/guardian
- 5. Other means prescribed by the Board

Regulation 5113: Absences And Excuses

Status: ADOPTED

Original Adopted Date: 11/01/2011 | Last Revised Date: 03/2022 | Last Reviewed Date: 03/2022

Excused Absences

Subject to any applicable limitation, condition, or other requirement specified in law, a student's absence shall be excused for any of the following reasons:

- 1. Personal illness, including absence for the benefit of the student's mental or behavioral health (Education Code 48205)
- 2. Quarantine under the direction of a county or city health officer (Education Code 48205)
- 3. Medical, dental. optometrical, or chiropractic services or appointment (Education Code 48205)
- 4. Attendance at funeral services for a member of the student's immediate family (Education Code 48205)

Such absence shall be limited to one day if the service is conducted in California or three days if the service is conducted out of state. (Education Code 48205)

- 5. Jury duty in the manner provided for by law (Education Code 48205)
- 6. Illness or medical appointment of a child to whom the student is the custodial parent (Education Code 48205)
- 7. Upon advance written request by the parent/guardian and the approval of the principal or designee, justifiable personal reasons including, but not limited to: (Education Code 48205)
 - a. Appearance in court
 - b. Attendance at a funeral service
 - c. Observance of a religious holiday or ceremony
 - d. Attendance at religious retreats for no more than four hours per semester
 - e. Attendance at an employment conference
 - f. Attendance at an educational conference on the legislative or judicial process offered by a nonprofit organization
- 8. Service as a member of a precinct board for an election pursuant to Elections Code 12302 (Education Code 48205)
- To spend time with an immediate family member who is an active duty member of the uniformed services, as defined in Education Code 49701, and has been called to duty for deployment to a combat zone or a combat support position or is on leave from or has immediately returned from such deployment (Education Code 48205)

Such absence shall be granted for a period of time to be determined at the discretion of the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 48205)

- 10. Attendance at the student's naturalization ceremony to become a United States citizen (Education Code 48205)
- 11. Participation in a cultural ceremony or event which relates to the habits, practices, beliefs, and traditions of a certain group of people (Education Code 48205)
- 12. Work in the entertainment or allied industry (Education Code 48225.5)

Work for a student who holds a work permit authorizing work in the entertainment or allied industries for a period of not more than five consecutive days. For this purpose, student absence shall be excused for a maximum of up to five absences per school year. (Education Code 48225.5)

13. Participation with a nonprofit performing arts organization in a performance for a public school audience (Education Code 48225.5)

A student may be excused for up to five such absences per school year provided that the student's parent/guardian provides a written explanation of such absence to the school. (Education Code 48225.5)

14. Other reasons authorized at the discretion of the principal or designee based on the student's specific circumstances (Education Code 48205, 48260)

For the purpose of the absences described above, immediate family means the student's parent/guardian, brother or sister, grandparent, or any other relative living in the student's household. (Education Code 48205)

Method of Verification

Student absence to care for a child for whom the student is the custodial parent shall not require a physician's note. (Education Code 48205)

For other absences, the student shall, upon returning to school following the absence, present a satisfactory explanation, either in person or by written note, verifying the reason for the absence. Absences shall be verified by the student's parent/guardian, other person having charge or control of the student, or the student if age 18 or older. (Education Code 46012; 5 CCR 306)

When an absence is planned, the principal or designee shall be notified prior to the date of the absence when possible.

The following methods may be used to verify student absences:

- 1. Written note, fax, email, or voice mail from parent/guardian or parent representative.
- 2. Conversation, in person or by telephone, between the verifying employee and the student's parent/guardian or parent representative. The employee shall subsequently record the following:
 - a. Name of student

- b. Name of parent/guardian or parent representative
- c. Name of verifying employee
- d. Date(s) of absence
- e. Reason for absence
- 3. Visit to the student's home by the verifying employee, or any other reasonable method which establishes the fact that the student was absent for the reasons stated. The employee shall document the verification and include the information specified in Item #2 above.
- 4. Physician's verification.
 - a. When excusing students for confidential medical services or verifying such appointments, district staff shall not ask the purpose of such appointments but may request a note from the medical office to confirm the time of the appointment.
 - b. If a student shows a pattern of chronic absenteeism due to illness, district staff may require physician verification of any further student absences.

Parental Notifications

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall:

- 1. Notify students in grades 7-12 and the parents/guardians of all students enrolled in the district that school authorities may excuse any student from school to obtain confidential medical services without the consent of the student's parent/guardian (Education Code 46010.1)
- 2. Notify parents/guardians that a student shall not have a grade reduced or lose academic credit for any excused absence if missed assignments and tests that can reasonably be provided are satisfactorily completed within a reasonable period of time. Such notice shall include the full text of Education Code 48205. (Education Code 48980)

Regulation 5142: Safety

Status: ADOPTED

Original Adopted Date: 07/01/2006 | Last Revised Date: 03/2022

At each school, the principal or designee shall establish emergency procedures, rules for student conduct, and rules for the safe and appropriate use of school facilities, equipment, and materials, consistent with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. The rules shall be communicated to students, distributed to parents/guardians, and readily available at the school at all times.

Release of Students

Students shall be released during the school day only to the custody of an adult who is one of the following:

- 1. The student's custodial parent/guardian
- 2. An adult authorized on the student's emergency card as an individual to whom the student may be released when the custodial parent/guardian cannot be reached, provided the principal or designee verifies the adult's identity
- 3. An authorized law enforcement officer acting in accordance with law
- 4. An adult taking the student to emergency medical care at the request of the principal or designee

Supervision of Students

Every teacher shall hold students to a strict account for their conduct on the way to and from school, on the playgrounds, and during recess. (Education Code 44807)

The principal or designee shall require all individuals supervising students to remain alert for unauthorized persons and dangerous conditions, and promptly report any unusual incidents to the principal or designee and file a written report as appropriate.

In arranging for appropriate supervision on playgrounds, the principal or designee shall:

- 1. Clearly identify supervision zones and require all playground supervisors to remain at a location from which they can observe their entire zone of supervision and be observed by students in the supervision zone
- 2. Consider the size of the playground area, the number of areas that are obstructed from open view, and the age of the students to determine the ratio of playground supervisors to students

At any school where playground supervision is not otherwise provided, the principal or designee shall provide for certificated employees to supervise the conduct and safety, and direct the play, of students who are on school grounds before and after school and during recess and other intermissions. (5 CCR 5552)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers, teacher aides, playground supervisors, yard aides, and volunteers who supervise students receive training in safety practices and in supervisory techniques that will help prevent problems and resolve conflicts among students. Such

training shall be documented and kept on file.

Playground Safety

Any new playground or any replacement of equipment or modification of components inside an existing playground shall conform to standards set forth by the American Society for Testing and Materials and the guidelines set forth by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission. The Superintendent or designee shall have a playground safety inspector certified by the National Playground Safety Institute conduct an initial inspection to aid compliance with applicable safety standards. (Health and Safety Code 115725)

Activities with Safety Risks

Due to concerns about the risk to student safety, the principal or designee shall not permit the following activities on campus or during school-sponsored events unless the activity is properly supervised, students wear protective gear as appropriate, and each participant has insurance coverage:

- 1. Trampolining
- 2. Scuba diving
- 3. Skateboarding or use of scooters
- 4. In-line or roller skating or use of skate shoes
- 5. Sailing, boating, or water skiing
- 6. Cross-country or downhill skiing
- 7. Motorcycling
- 8. Target shooting
- 9. Horseback riding
- 10. Rodeo
- 11. Archery
- 12. Mountain bicycling
- 13. Rock climbing
- 14. Rocketeering
- 15. Surfing
- 16. Other activities determined by the principal to have a high risk to student safety

Students who operate or ride as a passenger on a bicycle, nonmotorized scooter, or skateboard, or wear in-line or roller skates, upon a street, bikeway, or any other public bicycle path or trail shall wear a properly fitted and fastened bicycle helmet.

Events In or Around a Swimming Pool

When any on-campus event that is not part of an interscholastic athletic program is sponsored or hosted by the district and is to be held in or around a swimming pool, at least one adult with a valid

certification of cardiopulmonary resuscitation training shall be present throughout the duration of the event. (Education Code 35179.6)

Laboratory Safety

The principal of each school offering laboratory work shall develop procedures for laboratory safety and designate a trained certificated employee to implement and regularly review these procedures.

Students in a laboratory shall be under the supervision of a certificated employee. Students shall be taught laboratory safety, and safety guidelines and procedures shall be posted in science classrooms. Students shall receive continual reminders about general and specific hazards.

Hazardous materials shall be properly used, stored, and disposed of in accordance with law and the district's chemical hygiene plan.

Bloodborne pathogens shall be handled in accordance with the district's exposure control plan.

The district's emergency plan, emergency contact numbers, and first aid supplies shall be readily accessible.

Parents/guardians shall be made aware of the kinds of laboratory activities that will be conducted during the school year.

Eye Safety Devices

The Superintendent or designee shall provide schools with eye safety devices for use whenever students, teachers, or visitors are engaged in or observing an activity or using hazardous substances likely to cause injury to the eyes. Eye safety devices may be sold to students for an amount not to exceed the actual cost to the district. (Education Code 32030, 32031, 32033)

Protection Against Insect Bites

To help protect students against insect bites or stings that may spread disease or cause allergic reactions, students shall be allowed to apply insect repellent provided by their parents/guardians, when engaging in outdoor activities. Any application of insect repellent shall occur under the supervision of school personnel, and in accordance with the manufacturer's directions.

Cautionary Notice: Government Code 17581.5 releases districts from the obligation to perform specified mandated activities when the Budget Act does not provide reimbursement during that fiscal year. The Budget Act of 2021 (AB 128, Ch. 21, Statutes of 2021) extends the suspension of these requirements through the 2021-22 fiscal year. As a result, certain provisions of the following Exhibit related to scoliosis screening and bus safety instruction may be suspended.

Policy 6173: Education For Homeless Children

Original Adopted Date: 07/01/2005 | Last Revised Date: 03/2022 | Last Reviewed Date: 03/2022

The Governing Board believes that the identification of homeless students is critical to improving the educational outcomes of such students and ensuring that homeless students have access to the same free and appropriate public education provided to other students within the district. The district shall provide homeless students with access to education and other services necessary for such students to meet the same challenging academic standards as other students.

When there are at least 15 homeless students in the district or a district school, the district's local control and accountability plan (LCAP) shall include goals and specific actions to improve student achievement and other outcomes of homeless students. (Education Code 52052, 52060, 52064)

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly review and recommend updates to district policies to ensure removal of any barriers to the education of homeless students and unaccompanied youth. Any such review shall address identification, enrollment, and retention of such students, including those barriers that are due to absences or outstanding fees or fines. (42 USC 11432)

The Superintendent or designee shall designate an appropriate staff person to serve as a liaison for homeless children and youths. The district liaison for homeless students shall fulfill the duties specified in 42 USC 11432 to assist in identifying and supporting homeless students to succeed in school.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each district school identifies all homeless children and youths and unaccompanied youths enrolled at the school. (Education Code 48851)

To ensure easy identification of homeless students, the Superintendent or designee shall annually administer a housing questionnaire developed by the California Department of Education (CDE) to all parents/guardians of students and all unaccompanied youths. (Education Code 48851)

If the primary language of a student's parent/guardian or an unaccompanied youth is not English, either the housing questionnaire shall be made available in the primary language of the student's parent/guardian or the unaccompanied youth pursuant to Education Code 48985, or an appropriate translation of the housing questionnaire shall be provided upon request of a student's parent/guardian or an unaccompanied youth. (Education Code 48851)

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district liaison's contact information and other information on homelessness, including, but not limited to, information regarding the educational rights and resources available to persons experiencing homelessness, are posted on the district and school web sites as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. (Education Code 48852.6)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that placement decisions for homeless students are based on the student's best interest as defined in law and administrative regulation.

Each homeless student shall be provided services that are comparable to services offered to other students in the school, including, but not limited to, transportation, educational programs for which the student meets the eligibility criteria (such as federal Title I services or similar state or local programs, programs for students with disabilities, and educational programs for English learners), career and

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technical education programs, programs for gifted and talented students, and school nutrition programs. (42 USC 11432)

Homeless students shall not be segregated into a separate school or program based on their status as homeless and shall not be stigmatized in any way. However, the Superintendent or designee may separate homeless students on school grounds as necessary for short periods of time for health and safety emergencies or to provide temporary, special, and supplementary services to meet the unique needs of homeless students. (42 USC 11432, 11433)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that information and/or materials for homeless students are provided in a manner and form understandable to the parents/guardians of homeless students and to unaccompanied youths.

Information about a homeless student's living situation shall be considered part of a student's educational record, subject to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, shall not be deemed to be directory information as defined in 20 USC 1232g, and shall not be released without written consent. (42 USC 11432)

The Superintendent or designee shall coordinate with other agencies and entities to ensure that homeless children and youth are promptly identified, ensure that homeless students have access to and are in reasonable proximity to available education and related support services, and raise the awareness of school personnel and service providers of the effects of short-term stays in a shelter and other challenges associated with homelessness. Toward these ends, the Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with local social services agencies, other agencies or entities providing services to homeless children and youth, and, if applicable, transitional housing facilities. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall coordinate transportation, transfer of school records, and other interdistrict activities with other local educational agencies. As necessary, the Superintendent or designee shall coordinate, within the district and with other involved local educational agencies, services for homeless students and services for students with disabilities. (42 USC 11432)

At least annually, the district liaison and other appropriate staff shall participate in professional development and other technical assistance activities to assist them in identifying and meeting the needs of homeless students. Such professional development and technical assistance shall include, but are not limited to, training on the definitions of terms related to homelessness, the signs of homelessness, the steps that should be taken once a potentially homeless student is identified, and how to connect homeless students with appropriate housing and service providers. (Education Code 48852.5; 42 USC 11432)

The Superintendent or designee shall report to CDE the number of homeless children and youths and unaccompanied youths enrolled in the district as identified from the housing questionnaire described above. (Education Code 48851)

Regulation 6173: Education For Homeless Children

Status: ADOPTED

Original Adopted Date: 12/01/2014 | Last Revised Date: 03/2022 | Last Reviewed Date: 03/2022

Definitions

Homeless students means students who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence and includes: (Education Code 48859; 42 USC 11434a)

- 1. Students who are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason; are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations; are living in emergency or transitional shelters; or are abandoned in hospitals
- 2. Students who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as regular sleeping accommodations for human beings
- 3. Students who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings
- 4. Migratory children who qualify as homeless because they are living in conditions described in items #1-3 above

Unaccompanied youth includes a homeless child or youth not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian. (Education Code 48859; 42 USC 11434a)

School of origin means the school that the homeless student attended when permanently housed or the school in which the student was last enrolled, including a preschool. If the school the homeless student attended when permanently housed is different from the school in which the student was last enrolled, or if there is some other school that the student attended within the preceding 15 months and with which the student is connected, the district liaison for homeless students shall determine, in consultation with and with the agreement of the homeless student and the person holding the right to make educational decisions for the student, and in the best interests of the homeless student, which school shall be deemed the school of origin. (Education Code 48852.7; 42 USC 11432)

Best interest means that, in making educational and school placement decisions for a homeless student, consideration is given to, among other factors, educational stability, the opportunity to be educated in the least restrictive educational setting necessary to achieve academic progress, and the student's access to academic resources, services, and extracurricular and enrichment activities that are available to all district students. (Education Code 48850, 48853; 42 USC 11432)

District Liaison

The district's liaison for homeless students shall: (Education Code 48851.5, 48852.5; 42 USC 11432)

- 1. Ensure that homeless students are identified by school personnel through outreach and coordination activities with other entities and agencies
- 2. Ensure that homeless students are enrolled in, and have a full and equal opportunity to succeed in, district schools
- 3. Ensure that homeless families and children and youth have access to and receive educational services for which they are eligible, including services through Head Start and Early Head Start programs, early intervention services under Part C of the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, and other preschool programs administered by the district
- 4. Ensure that homeless families and students receive referrals to health care services, dental services, mental health and substance abuse services, housing services, and other appropriate services
- 5. Inform parents/guardians of the educational and related opportunities available to their children and ensure that they are provided with meaningful opportunities to participate in the education of their children
- 6. Disseminate public notice of the educational rights of homeless students in locations frequented by parents/guardians of homeless children and youth and by unaccompanied youth, including schools, shelters, public libraries, and hunger relief agencies (soup kitchens). The rights shall be presented in a manner and form understandable to the parents/guardians of homeless students and unaccompanied youth.
- 7. Mediate enrollment disputes in accordance with law and the section "Resolving Enrollment Disputes" below
- 8. Fully inform parents/guardians of homeless students and unaccompanied youth of all transportation services, including transportation to the school of origin, and assist them in accessing transportation to the school of choice
- Ensure that school personnel providing services to homeless students, including principals and other school leaders, attendance supervisors, teachers, enrollment personnel, and specialized instructional support personnel, receive professional development and other support
- 10. Ensure that unaccompanied youth are enrolled in school, have opportunities to meet the same challenging state academic standards established for other students, and are informed of their status as independent students under 20 USC 1087vv and that they may receive assistance from the district liaison to receive verification of their independent student status for purposes of applying for federal student aid pursuant to 20 USC 1090
- 11. Coordinate and collaborate with state coordinators and community and school personnel responsible for the provision of education and related services to homeless students, including the collection and provision of comprehensive data to the state coordinator as required by law

In addition, when notified pursuant to Education Code 48918.1, the district liaison shall assist, facilitate, or represent a homeless student who is undergoing a disciplinary proceeding that could result in the student's expulsion. When notified pursuant to Education Code 48915.5, the district liaison shall participate in an individualized education program (IEP) team meeting to make a manifestation determination regarding the behavior of a student with a disability.

The Superintendent or designee shall inform homeless children and youth, their parents/guardians, school personnel, service providers, and advocates working with homeless families of the duties of the district's liaison. The Superintendent or designee shall also provide the name and contact information of the district's liaison to the California Department of Education (CDE) for publishing on CDE's web site. (42 USC 11432)

Enrollment

The district shall make placement decisions for homeless students based on the student's best interest. (42 USC 11432)

In determining the best interest of the student, the district shall consider student-centered factors related to the student's best interest, including factors related to the impact of mobility on achievement, education, health, and safety, giving priority to the request of the student's parent/guardian or, in the case of an unaccompanied youth, the youth. (42 USC 11432)

Such factors may include, but are not limited to, the age of the student, the distance of the commute and the impact it may have on the student's education, personal safety issues, the student's need for special instruction, the length of anticipated stay in the temporary shelter or other temporary location, likely area of future housing, school placement of siblings, and the time remaining in the school year.

However, placement decisions shall not be based on whether a homeless student lives with the student's homeless parent/guardian or has been temporarily placed elsewhere. (42 USC 11432)

In the case of an unaccompanied youth, the district liaison shall assist in placement or enrollment decisions, give priority to the views of the student, and provide notice to the student of the right to appeal. (42 USC 11432)

In determining a student's best interest, a homeless student shall, to the extent feasible, be placed in the school of origin, unless the student's parent/guardian or the unaccompanied youth requests otherwise. (Education Code 48852.7; 42 USC 11432)

Once a placement decision has been made, the principal or designee shall immediately enroll the student in the school of choice. The student shall be enrolled even if the student: (Education Code 48850, 48852.7; 42 USC 11432)

- 1. Has outstanding fees, fines, textbooks, or other items or monies due to the school last attended
- 2. Does not have clothing normally required by the school, such as school uniforms
- 3. Is unable to produce records normally required for enrollment, such as previous academic records, proof of residency, and records of immunization and other required health records
- 4. Has missed application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness

The principal or designee shall immediately contact the school last attended by the student to obtain the relevant records. If the student needs to obtain immunizations or does not possess immunization or other required health records, the principal or designee shall immediately refer the parent/guardian to the district liaison for homeless students. The district liaison shall assist the parent/guardian, or the student if the student is an unaccompanied youth, in obtaining the necessary immunizations, screenings, or records for the student. (42 USC 11432)

If the student is placed at a school other than the school of origin or the school requested by the student's parent/guardian or the student, if an unaccompanied youth, the Superintendent or designee shall provide the parent/guardian or the unaccompanied youth with a written explanation of the reasons for the decision, including why placement in the student's school of origin or requested school is not in the student's best interest, along with a statement regarding the right to appeal the placement decision. The written explanation shall be in a manner and form understandable to such parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth. (42 USC 11432)

At the point of any change or subsequent change in the residence of a homeless student, the student may continue attending the student's school of origin for the duration of the homelessness. (Education Code 48852.7; 42 USC 11432)

To ensure that the homeless student has the benefit of matriculating with the student's peers in accordance with the established feeder patterns, the following shall apply: (Education Code 48852.7; 42 USC 11432)

- 1. If the student is transitioning between grade levels, the student shall be allowed to continue in the same attendance area.
- 2. If the student is transitioning to a middle school or high school, and the school designated for matriculation is in another school district, the student shall be allowed to continue to the school designated for matriculation in that district.

If the student's status changes before the end of the school year so that the student is no longer homeless, the student shall be allowed to stay in the school of origin: (Education Code 48852.7)

- 1. Through the duration of the school year if the student is in grades K-8
- 2. Through graduation if the student is in high school

Resolving Enrollment Disputes

If a dispute arises over student eligibility, school selection, or enrollment in a particular school, the matter shall be referred to the district liaison, who shall carry out the dispute resolution process as expeditiously as possible. (42 USC 11432)

The parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth shall be provided with a written explanation of any decisions related to eligibility, school selection, or enrollment and of the right of the parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth to appeal such decisions. (42 USC 11432) The written explanation shall include:

- 1. A description of the action proposed or refused by the district
- 2. An explanation of why the action is proposed or refused

- 3. A description of any other options the district considered and the reasons that any other options were rejected
- 4. A description of any other factors relevant to the district's decision and information related to the eligibility or best interest determination including the facts, witnesses, and evidence relied upon and their sources
- 5. Appropriate timelines to ensure any relevant deadlines are not missed
- 6. Contact information for the district liaison and state coordinator, and a brief description of those roles

The written explanation shall be complete, as brief as possible, simply stated, and provided in language that the parent/guardian or student can understand.

The district liaison may use an informal process as an alternative to formal dispute resolution procedures, provided that the parents/guardians or unaccompanied youth have access to the more formal process if informal resolution is not successful in resolving the matter.

In working with a student's parents/guardians or unaccompanied youth to resolve an enrollment dispute, the district liaison shall:

- 1. Inform them that they may provide written and/or oral documentation to support their position
- 2. Inform them that they may seek the assistance of social services, advocates, and/or service providers in having the dispute resolved
- 3. Provide them a simple form that they may use and turn in to the school to initiate the dispute resolution process
- 4. Provide them a copy of the dispute form they submit for their records
- 5. Provide them the outcome of the dispute for their records

When a student's parent/guardian or an unaccompanied youth involved in the enrollment dispute is an English learner, Items #1-5 shall be provided either in the native language of the parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth or through an interpreter, and any additional support needed because of a disability of that parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth shall be made available without a charge.

If a parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth disagrees with the district liaison's enrollment decision, the decision may be appealed to the Superintendent. The Superintendent shall make a determination within five working days.

If the parent/guardian chooses to appeal the district's placement decision, the district liaison shall forward all written documentation and related paperwork to the liaison for homeless students at the county office of education.

Pending final resolution of the dispute, including all available appeals, the student shall be immediately enrolled in the school in which enrollment is sought and shall be allowed to attend classes and participate fully in school activities. (42 USC 11432, 11434a)

Transportation

The district shall provide transportation for a homeless student to and from the student's school of origin when the student is residing within the district and the parent/guardian, or the district liaison in

the case of an unaccompanied youth, requests that such transportation be provided. If the student moves outside of district boundaries, but continues to attend the student's school of origin within this district, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with the superintendent of the district in which the student is now residing to agree upon a method to apportion the responsibility and costs of the transportation. (42 USC 11432)

The district shall not be obligated to provide transportation to students who continue attending their school of origin after they cease to be homeless, unless the formerly homeless student has an IEP that includes transportation as a necessary related service for the student. (Education Code 48852.7)

Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities

A homeless student who enrolls in any district school shall have access to extracurricular and enrichment activities that are available to all students in the school, including but not limited to, interscholastic sports administered by the California Interscholastic Federation. (Education Code 48850)

Notification, Complaints, and Posting Requirements

Information regarding the educational rights of homeless students, as specified in Education Code 51225.1 and 51225.2, shall be included in the annual uniform complaint procedures notification distributed to students, parents/guardians, employees, and other interested parties pursuant to 5 CCR 4622. (Education Code 51225.1, 51225.2)

Any complaint that the district has not complied with requirements regarding the education of homeless students, as specified in Education Code 51225.1 or 51225.2, may be filed in accordance with the district's procedures in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

Bylaw 9322: Agenda/Meeting Materials

Agenda Content

Governing Board meeting agendas shall reflect the district's vision and goals and the Board's focus on student learning and well-being.

Each agenda shall state the meeting time and location and shall briefly describe each item to be transacted or discussed, including items to be discussed in closed session. (Government Code 54954.2)

The agenda shall provide members of the public the opportunity to address the Board on any agenda item before or during the Board's consideration of the item. However, the agenda need not provide an opportunity for public comment when the agenda item has previously been considered at an open meeting by a committee comprised exclusively of Board members, provided that members of the public were afforded an opportunity to comment on the item, before or during the committee's consideration of the item, and the item has not been substantially changed since the committee considered it. (Government Code 54954.3)

The agenda for a regular Board meeting shall also provide members of the public an opportunity to provide comment on matters which are not on the agenda but which are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. (Education Code 35145.5; Government Code 54954.3)

Each agenda for a regular meeting shall list the address designated by the Superintendent or designee for public inspection of documents related to an open session item that have been distributed to the Board less than 72 hours before the meeting. (Government Code 54957.5)

The agenda shall include information regarding how, when, and to whom a request for disabilityrelated accommodations or modifications, including auxiliary aids and services, may be made by an individual who requires accommodations or modifications in order to participate in the Board meeting. (Government Code 54954.2)

Agenda Preparation

The Board president and the Superintendent, as secretary to the Board, shall work together to develop the agenda for each regular and special meeting.

Any Board member or member of the public may request that a matter within the jurisdiction of the Board be placed on the agenda of a regular meeting. The request shall be submitted in writing to the Superintendent or designee with supporting documents and information, if any, at least one week before the scheduled meeting date. Items submitted less than a week before the scheduled meeting date may be postponed to a later meeting in order to allow sufficient time for consideration and research of the issue.

The Board president and Superintendent shall decide whether a request from a member of the public is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. Items not within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board may not be placed on the agenda. In addition, before placing the item on the agenda, the

Board president and Superintendent shall determine if the item is merely a request for information, and if so, respond accordingly.

If the Board president and Superintendent deny a request from a Board member to place an item on the agenda, the Board member may request the Board to take action to determine whether the item shall be placed on the agenda.

The Board president and Superintendent shall also decide whether an agenda item is appropriate for discussion in open or closed session, and whether the item should be an action item subject to Board vote or an information item that does not require immediate action.

In order to promote efficient meetings, the Board may bundle a number of items and act upon them together by a single vote through the use of a consent agenda. Consent items shall be items of a routine nature and items for which Board discussion is not anticipated and for which the Superintendent recommends approval. When any Board member requests the removal of an item from the consent agenda, the item shall be removed and given individual consideration for action as a regular agenda item.

The agenda shall provide an opportunity for members of the public to comment on any consent agenda item unless such item has been previously considered at an open meeting of a committee comprised exclusively of Board members. (Government Code 54954.3)

Any Board action that involves borrowing \$100,000 or more shall be discussed, considered, and deliberated upon as a separate item of business on the meeting agenda. (Government Code 53635.7)

All public communications with the Board are subject to requirements of relevant Board policies and administrative regulations.

Agenda Dissemination to Board Members

At least 72 hours before each regular meeting, each Board member shall be provided a copy of the agenda and agenda packet, including the Superintendent or designee's report; minutes to be approved; copies of communications; reports from committees, staff, and others; and other available supporting documents pertinent to the meeting.

When special meetings are called, Board members shall receive, at least 24 hours prior to the meeting, notice of the business to be transacted. (Government Code 54956)

Board members shall review agenda materials before each meeting. Individual members may confer directly with the Superintendent or designee to ask questions and/or request additional information on agenda items. However, a majority of Board members shall not, outside of a noticed meeting, directly or through intermediaries or electronic means discuss, deliberate, or take action on any matter within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board.

Agenda Dissemination to Members of the Public

Any agenda and related materials distributed to the Board shall be made available to the public upon request without delay. Only those documents which are disclosable public records under the Public Records Act (PRA) and which relate to an agenda item scheduled for the open session portion of a regular meeting shall be made available to the public. (Government Code 54957.5)

At least 72 hours prior to a regular meeting, the agenda shall be posted at one or more locations freely accessible to members of the public. (Government Code 54954.2)

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall post the agenda on the homepage of the district web site. The posted agenda shall be accessible through a prominent direct link to the current agenda or to the district's agenda management platform in accordance with Government Code 54954.2. When the district utilizes an integrated agenda management platform, the link to that platform shall take the user directly to the web site with the district's agendas, and the current agenda shall be the first available. (Government Code 54954.2)

If a document which relates to an open session agenda item of a regular Board meeting is distributed to the Board less than 72 hours prior to a meeting, the Superintendent or designee shall make the document available for public inspection at a designated location at the same time the document is distributed to all or a majority of the Board. (Government Code 54957.5)

The Superintendent or designee shall mail a copy of the agenda or a copy of all the documents constituting the agenda packet to any person who requests the items. The materials shall be mailed at the time the agenda is posted or upon distribution of the agenda to a majority of the Board, whichever occurs first. (Government Code 54954.1)

The Superintendent or designee shall email a copy of, or a web site link to, the agenda or a copy of all the documents constituting the agenda packet to any person who requests such items to be delivered by email. If the Superintendent or designee determines that it is technologically infeasible to do so, a copy of the agenda or a web site link to the agenda and a copy of all other documents constituting the agenda packet shall be sent to the person who has made the request in accordance with mailing requirements specified in law. (Government Code 54954.1)

Any request for mailed copies of agendas or agenda packets shall be in writing and shall be valid for the calendar year in which it is filed. Written requests must be renewed following January 1 of each year. (Government Code 54954.1)

Persons requesting mailing of the agenda or agenda packet shall pay an annual fee, as determined by the Superintendent or designee, not to exceed the cost of providing the service.

Any document prepared by the district or Board and distributed during a public meeting shall be made available for public inspection at the meeting. Any document prepared by another person shall be made available for public inspection after the meeting. These requirements shall not apply to a document that is exempt from public disclosure under the PRA. (Government Code 54957.5)

Upon request, the Superintendent or designee shall make the agenda, agenda packet, and/or any writings distributed at the meeting available in appropriate alternative formats to persons with a disability, as required by the Americans with Disabilities Act. (Government Code 54954.1)
